ROUTINE PRACTICES to be used with ALL PATIENTS/RESIDENTS/CLIENTS



Hand Hygiene

Hand hygiene is performed using soap and water or alcohol-based hand rub:

- Before and after each patient/resident/client contact
- Before performing invasive procedures
- Before putting on and after taking off gloves and personal protective equipment
- Whenever hands come into contact with secretions, excretions, blood and body fluids
- After contact with items in the patient/resident/client's environment



Mask and Eye Protection or Face Shield

• Protect eyes, nose and mouth during procedures and care activities likely to generate splashes or sprays of blood, body fluids, secretions or excretions.




Gown

• Wear a long-sleeved gown if contamination of skin or clothing is anticipated.



Gloves

- Wear gloves when there is a risk of hand contact with blood, body fluids, secretions, excretions, non-intact skin, mucous membranes or contaminated surfaces or objects.
- Wearing gloves is NOT a substitute for hand hygiene.
- Remove immediately after use and perform hand hygiene after removing gloves.



Environment and Equipment

- All equipment that is being used by more than one patient/ resident/ client must be cleaned between patients/residents/clients.
- All frequently touched surfaces in the patient/resident/client's room must be cleaned daily.



Linen and Waste

 Handle soiled linen and waste carefully to prevent personal contamination and transfer to other patients/residents/clients.



Sharps Injury Prevention

- NEVER RECAP USED NEEDLES.
- Place sharps in sharps containers.
- Prevent injuries from needles, scalpels and other sharp devices.
- Where possible, use safety-engineered medical devices.
